Ladder Charm Necklace 2020

The Ladders were created to remind us that we are always reaching for something elusive that is just beyond our reach; with the esoteric way we face life changes, we all need a little help. This grouping consists of precious metals and stones and is a fun way to visualize how we are aided in reaching and attaining our goals.

Woodland Fray Tiara 2018—Created with orange and yellow tube set C-Z, peridot discs scattered throughout, carved yellow-green serpentinite leaves, and variegated size/green color set outside and in. The stage for the tiara to be seen and worn is set, but still with the hidden pearls inside - you will be the fairy queen attending a ball.

Tigers Versus Diamonds. 2020—The piece is a visual narration of the public's universal acceptance and belief structure that "diamonds are precious and forever"; however, diamonds are 100% carbon when exposed to fire that burns, as prolific as grains of sand, and found on every continent. Yet, tigers are precious, not everlasting, with a yearly declining population - 1969=100,00 and 2021=2300. I incorporated my drawings into wearable art with diminishing/ reduced tiger photocopies to 1/2" toggle. Materials: paper, mica, acetate, copper, and yellow diamond

Water Earrings 1 and 11. 2022—The variations in how we literally visualize and interpret water are limitless. Water is viewed as form, lines, textures, motion, and reflections. These qualities are captured within the very essence of these earrings, which feature motion, sparkle, line, form, depth, and a wee bit of opal and diamond magic. As a Seattleite, I flourish among the raindrops, a water baby who has been on and around water for my entire existence. I have spent half of my life teaching both scuba and swimming, involved in canoeing and sailing, and spent six weeks aboard a research ship.

Save the Bees Broches—The word "gratitude" does not even describe my appreciation and devotion to the industrious honeybees of our planet. These small but not insignificant insects are why we have a produce department and other related food sources that require pollination to create our eating enjoyment and survival. They also produce honey, which sustains their lifecycle and enriches our daily lives. If honeybees vanish from our blue planet, we, and other ecological groups will follow suit. This planet is an ecosystem that depends on each other to survive, and the domino effect comes into play when one major component vanishes. I want my one-month-old great-grandson to enjoy a full life, and honeybees will ensure it, as well as many other factors. My gratitude reaches out daily to these little members of our life cycle.
