Bainbridge Island Museum of Art Announces Within/Earshot Jazz Festival Lineup – Celebrating the Region's Finest Jazz Artists This October

(Bainbridge Island, Wash.) — Bainbridge Island Museum of Art (BIMA) is thrilled to announce the return of its dynamic collaboration with Seattle's Earshot Jazz as part of the acclaimed **Earshot Jazz Festival**—the Pacific Northwest's most prestigious celebration of jazz. Held throughout **October**, the **BIMA Annual Within/Earshot Jazz Festival** transforms the museum's auditorium into a vibrant hub of creativity and improvisation. More than just a concert series, the festival is a living conversation between music and storytelling—bringing together artists and experts from across the jazz spectrum to explore the genre's rich legacy and boundless future.

"BIMA is proud to once again partner with Earshot Jazz," said Sade McInnis, Director of Museum Events. Each performance in the series offers something distinct: from evocative modern compositions that push the boundaries of jazz, to lively tributes to the speakeasy-era swing, and the textured rhythms of Brazilian folk traditions. The festival also highlights fresh, innovative voices from the Northwest, reflecting the cultural diversity and evolution of the genre.

Whether you attend a single event or engage with the full month-long program, the Within/Earshot Jazz Festival promises an unforgettable journey through sound, story, and culture—underscoring jazz's enduring ability to connect, challenge, and inspire.

"Jazz is still one of the most vibrant and contemporary musical expressions, just like the art hanging on BIMA's walls," said Korum Bischoff, BIMA's Deputy Director. "With the ability to cross between cultures and genres, and do so with improvisation at its core, is like hearing a musical conversation at the crossroads of the world. How lucky we are to bring so many talented regional scenesters to BIMA's auditorium for our members and neighbors to hear."

Jazz = Culture: Storytelling

Jazz with Jim: Jazz Gems Past & Present

10/7 - 7 PM | Round Midnight (1986) (2 HR)

Dexter Gordon's Oscar-nominated performance anchors this smoky late-1950s tale of a fragile saxophone genius rebuilding his life in Paris's expat jazz scene. Featuring real players like Gordon and Herbie Hancock, the film's long, lingering takes capture ballads that express what words cannot. At its heart, it's about how friendship, attentive listening, and intimate venues kept modern jazz alive across continents.

10/14 - 7 PM | Mo' Better Blues (1990) (2 HR)

Bleek Gilliam is a gifted yet self-absorbed jazz trumpeter whose dedication to his music strains his relationships, especially with the women in his life. As Bleek forms his own band, The Bleek Gilliam Quartet, tensions rise with bandmate Shadow, threatening to tear the group apart.

10/21 - 7 PM | The Cotton Club (1984) (2 HR)

Francis Ford Coppola immerses viewers in the legendary 1920s Harlem nightclub, where dazzling stage revues, fiery dance bands, and tap performances collide with the realities of Prohibition and segregation. While stylized, the film's music, choreography, and Ellington-era sounds reveal how early showbiz helped bring jazz into the American mainstream—even as questions of access and credit remain.
