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National Celebration of Craft Comes to Puget Sound

Puget Sound organizations join nationwide initiative, Handwork: Celebrating American

Craft 2026

PUGET SOUND, Wash. – As part of America250, museums, community art spaces, and creative organizations across Puget Sound are proud to participate in <u>Handwork: Celebrating</u> <u>American Craft 2026</u>, a national initiative organized by Craft in America.

Among the more than 250 organizations taking part across the country, some of the local Puget Sound participants include Bainbridge Island Museum of Art (BIMA), Bainbridge Artisan Resource Network (BARN), s'gwi gwi ? altxw: House of Welcome, Northwest Designer Craftartists (NWDC), Museum of Glass, and Burke Museum of Natural History and Culture.

Handwork 2026 is a nationwide initiative to honor the handmade during America's Semiquincentennial. Throughout 2026, museums, cultural centers, schools, and organizations across the country will present exhibitions, community events, workshops, and more to honor and showcase the legacy and vitality of craft in the country.

"The incredible diversity of handwork across America reflects the diversity of our nation itself and connects generations and communities," said Greg Robinson, Cynthia Sears Endowed Chief Curator at BIMA. "Each tradition brings its own history, methods, and stories to the art of craft. It's a joy to honor both the legacy of these creative forms and to uplift the new directions that artists are taking them today."

Across Puget Sound, each participating organization will highlight the spirit of *Handwork 2026* through unique programming:

Bainbridge Island Museum of Art: Beginning in March 2026, BIMA's exhibitions will center on the yearlong theme of "Connected by Craft." Each exhibition in 2026 will explore craft through different mediums and perspectives, each with its own story to tell and history to share. BIMA's nine exhibitions will be complemented by a dynamic range of presentations, panel discussions,

workshops, videos, print publications, and other related programs and activations.

- Spring, March 6-June 7: George & David Lewis: Deeply Rooted, Crafting Futures: Emerging Artists Invitational, Aimee Lee: Tethered
- Summer, July 3-September 20: Carletta Carrington Wilson: Object Lessons, Indigenous Craft, Cloth, Paper, Stitches (Artists' Books)
- Fall, October 2-January 31: Pratt Fine Arts Center @ 50, Heikki Seppä: Master Metalsmith, and Booking: Artists' Books by Black Artists

<u>Bainbridge Artisan Resource Network</u>: From April 26 to May 1, 2026, BARN will host "Handwork Week," a series of workshops led by renowned instructors to celebrate the many forms of craft, from basketmaking to creative writing.

Northwest Designer Craftartists: In 2026, NWDC will contribute to Handwork with exhibitions that showcase the creativity of Northwest artists working in clay, wood, glass, metal, fiber, and mixed media.

- The series opens in April at Gallery at the Park in Richland, WA, where
 Vicki Piper and Ron Gerton will serve as jurors, then continues in July at
 Postmark Center for the Arts in Auburn, WA, where Barbara Matilsky will
 serve as juror, and concludes in October at Kirkland Arts Center in
 Kirkland, WA.
- Alongside the exhibitions, NWDC will feature The Living Treasures Project, their
 ongoing series of video portraits documenting the lives, work, and influence of
 the Northwest's most important elder craft artists.
- NWDC also continues its Zoom Member Artist Talk series, giving members and the public opportunities to connect directly with artists, learn about their techniques, and hear the stories behind their work.

Museum of Glass: Museum of Glass celebrates the handmade every day in its Hot Shop. Each year, the Museum's Visiting Artist Residency Program invites over 40 artists to the Hot Shop to create new works in glass with the Hot Shop Team. This year's Visiting Artist lineup includes Preston Singletary, Martin Janecky, Raven Skyriver, Kelly O'Dell, Sam Drumgoole, Anya Gallaccio, Kartini Thomas, Einar and Jamex de la Torre, and more. The complete Visiting Artist lineup will be announced in late 2025.

Burke Museum: This year, the Burke Museum celebrates the handwork of Coast Salish weavers in its new exhibition, Woven in Wool: Resilience in Coast Salish Weaving. Co-curated by weavers from the Coast Salish Wool Weaving Center, this first-of-its-kind exhibition brings to the forefront more than a thousand years of artistic weaving traditions. It showcases both historical and contemporary woven creations, including blankets, tunics, hoods, and skirts.

Visitors will journey through the seasonal cycle of weaving, from gathering materials and spinning wool to dyeing with natural ingredients and weaving intricate designs. The exhibit features firsthand stories from the weavers themselves, items from the Burke collections, 15 new creations — all woven with goat hair collected over 10 years — and significant historical items on loan from other museums.

"Craft has this remarkable power to bring people together across all kinds of boundaries—cultural, generational, geographic," said Grae Drake, BARN's Executive Director. "When you gather makers this accomplished and this diverse in one place, something extraordinary happens. We're not just teaching techniques; we're creating connections that honor our creative heritage while inspiring innovation. I'm incredibly proud that BARN can serve as the gathering place for this kind of transformative community building."

BARN aims to grow and inspire a creative community through craft, learning, and service.
